Acts 1-7: The Beginnings...

Acts 1: The Great Commission (verse 8)
"But you will receive power when the Holy
Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."



Acts 2:

The Holy Spirit moves at Pentecost, and the Church begins. The first-generation church in Jerusalem is founded.



Acts 3:

Confirmation that Jesus is the fulfilment of God's plan from long ago, given to us from the prophets.

Acts 4 & 5:

Stories of struggles from both inside the church family (internal conflicts) and outside the church family (non-believing Jews) — but the church family in Jerusalem becomes a community of faith, loving and leaning on each other.

Acts 6:

The church organizes in order to better care for the whole church family.

Acts 7:

Stephen (the deacon) and the powerful sermon that launches the Church beyond Jerusalem.

Acts 8-15: Uncharted Territory

Acts 8:

The Church scatters as persecution begins.



Acts 9:

Saul/Paul is converted. The persecutor becomes the propagator of the gospel.


Acts 10:

Peter is challenged with "unclean" traditions, and Cornelius, the Roman officer, is converted. The gospel moves from the Jews to the Gentiles.



Acts 11:

Antioch, the second-generation church, is founded as a missions church in Gentile regions.




Acts 12:

Paul and Barnabas on their first missionary journey



Acts 15:

The Council in Jerusalem makes a decision about taking the gospel into the Gentile world — their "uncharted territory."

Grace: Our Message

Ephesians 2:8

For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God— not by works, so that no one can boast.

Identity: Our Character

2 Corinthians 5:17-19

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them.

Liberty With Restraint: Our Actions

1 Corinthians 10:23-24 (The Believer's Freedom)

"I have the right to do anything," you say—but not everything is beneficial. "I have the right to do anything"—but not everything is constructive. No one should seek their own good, but the good of others.

Romans 12:1-2

Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship. Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will.

Singular Devotion: Our Heart

Ephesians 4:4-6

There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.

Philippians 2:9-11

Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Ambassadors

2 Corinthians 5:17-20

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God.
